PIZZA AT CAFÉ REYES

Before I get into the heart of this review, I must tell you I am a persnickety pizza purist. If someone were to tell me that they just had a pizza with ham and pineapple chunks on it, a dreadful travesty called a pizza Hawaiian, I would become seriously ill. My retching sounds would speak volumes, far more than my words could describe. Fooling around with this ancient and revered Italian mainstay is tantamount to performing a Mozart symphony on a kazoo—yes, it can be done, but why?

Fortunately, there is a group dedicated to keeping pizza pure. It is the Associazione Verace Pizza Napoletana, founded in 1984, that has set out strict and correct rules for an authentic Neapolitan pizza. These rules include: the dough must be hand kneaded. Only San Marzano tomatoes can be used, mostly because they are the best in the world. The pizza must be baked in a wood-fired, domed oven at a temperature around 900 degrees Fahrenheit for no more than 90 seconds and should be about 12 inches in diameter and—note well—be no more than about 1/10 of an inch thick (a third of a centimeter to be exact.) And there can only be two kinds—pizza marinara or pizza Margherita, named after a queen of Italy (1851-1926).

You are asking, who could possibly adhere to these strict rules? Surely no pizzeria in these parts—well, that is, up to now. Café Reyes has morphed into such a place, dispensing true pizzas that would cheer to heart of even a pizza critic in Naples.

It is true. Owner Robert Harvell did his homework before Café Reyes turned to pizza as its stock in trade. And true to form, the first two pizzas on the menu are marinara and Margherita and both are excellent. The marinara, with just sauce and garlic, is of historic gourmet importance in West Marin—the garlic is fresh, grown here and thinly shaved by hand. The Margherita has mozzarella, San Marzano sauce and basil, the red white and green colors paying honor to the Queen Margherita and the Italian flag.

Yes, I confess, that Café Reyes adds other variations to pizza, including one named “The Inverness” which Bambi and Buck Gores enjoyed. Made with delicious mushrooms and sausage, I suppose if one has to tamper with the rules, this would be the way to tamper. I sneaked a bite and it was excellent. The delicious green salad could feed a small army.

Café Reyes pizza can be enjoyed from noon to 9 p.m. every day of the week. Delightfully, Harvell has set the pizza bar really high! If, as rumor has it, Rosie’s Café is going the pizza route, it might do well to rethink it. Café Reyes pizza is that good! Ed Schwartz

JUNIOR SAILING

US SAILING SAFE POWER BOATING COURSE AT THE IYC

On June 23-24, the first two days of the Youth Sailing Instructors Preparation week, the IYC hosted a US Sailing Safe Power Boating Course. The instructor for the course was Charlie Arms, the Director of Sailing at the California Maritime Academy.

The participants in the course were: Head Youth Sailing Program Instructor Isabelle LeMieux (Humboldt State); Youth Sailing Instructors, Davis Allen (Humboldt State), Seamus Pettigrew (U of Oregon), Logan Weir (Fordham), Walker Weir (UCSC), Eliza White (Bay School SF); Flying Scot Fleet Capt., Peter Ackley; Race Committee Chair, Peter Lassetter; Youth Sailing Shore Supervisor, Mike Meszaros; Recent Past Race Committee Chair, Mike Severson; and Youth Sailing Committee Chair, Pat White.



As we had lower low tides on the mornings of the course days, the Club is appreciative of the graciousness of Dudley and Sarah Miller for letting us use the dock at Shallow Beach to park the Club Whaler's the night before and get the participants on the water on the course days.

The course was rigorous. Participants prepared by reading US Sailing Certification Series Books "Start Powerboating Right" and "Safety, Rescue, & Support". There was a class room component on both days followed by a written test based on the content of the books. The on the water drills included:

- * Docking and slow speed drills - Undocking, backward slalom, holding position, pivot turn, overboard recovery, steering a range, towing, docking.
- * High speed maneuvers – figure eight, avoidance turn, high speed stop.
- * Race support boat operations – tow and be towed, distressed sailboat recoveries, setting marks.

Participants who successfully completed the examinations and practical exercises received US Sailing Safe Powerboating Certification, a Safety and Rescue Endorsement, and a Support Boat Endorsement.

All of the Youth Program Instructors had previously taken a US Sailing two weekend course certifying them as Small Boat Sailing instructors. To be certified as an instructor, they were also required to take a Red Cross CPR and Basic First Aid class.

The US Sailing Safe Powerboating Course was excellent, developing important skills for both our Youth Sailing Instructors and Race Committee. When not instructing or racing themselves, we may see some of our Instructors out on the IYC race support boat as well.
